Police report

Regular patrols have been carried out in the area throughout the summer namely Bewick Close and the surrounding areas of Waldridge Park in relation to reports of Anti-Social Behaviour occurring in the wooded area to the rear of Bewick Close.

We have received many complaints from local residents and dog walkers of underage drinking, substance misuse, and criminal damage to trees being caused by fires. A police plan 'POP' - 'Problem Orientated Partnerships', has been set up to target individuals and groups of youths causing us problems in the area with an aim to working alongside one another we can use this plan to tackle Anti Social Behaviour and make the area a safer place to live. If anyone has any concerns or would like to contact myself regarding the area please feel free to contact me on below email or alternatively if you see something on-going call 101 to report an incident.

Chester-Le-Street Police are always welcoming new members to join our Neighbourhood Watch Scheme within the area. We currently have 0 schemes set up in Waldridge Village itself and appreciate anyone who would be interested in taking part to come forward and pass on their details to our Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator Lesley.hunter@durham.pnn.police.uk, being a part of the scheme does not have to be a full time job in itself you can wish to take part in as much or as little as you can spare to assist us.

Parish rooms for hire

These rooms can be used for local groups, organisations for young and old, charities, jumble sales or parties, at £3.00 per hour and £5.00 per hour for kitchen facilities. An ideal venue for your children to have a birthday party, with kitchen and toilet facilities available.

How can I discourage my neighbour's cat from fouling in my garden?

We have had a lot of complaints recently about roaming cats, unfortunately there is nothing legal that can be done like dog fouling. But here are some things for you to try to discourage cats from using your garden as their litter tray:

- Water flower beds last thing at night. Cats dislike wet soil.
- Push twig-like sticks into soil, especially near areas where new plants or seeds have been sown.
- Cover flower beds with netting or chicken wire.
- Old tea bags or broken egg shells scattered around flower beds may discourage cats.
- Orange and citrus smells, or oil of peppermint and eucalyptus can be very effective in keeping a flower bed cat free.
- Avoid the use of woodchip in large parts of your garden. Cats like the woodchip as they can scratch upon it, so it should best be avoided.
- Cats dislike walking through long grass, so leaving your grass to grow will prevent them from roaming around your garden too much

There are also a number of products available to buy which can help deter cats.

- Ultrasonic deterrents these detect the presence of a cat and triggers a loud sudden burst
 of high pitched sound which deters the cat from the property. Because the alarm is ultra
 sonic, the noise is inaudible to humans, and so will not become a nuisance to your
 neighbours! Alternatively, 'water jet' repellents are available, which emit a jet of water to
 startle the cat and deter from it from the area.
- Scented gels/sprays these gels and sprays can be easily applied to a variety of surfaces and terrain to deter cats through the use of a scent that they find intolerable. These prod ucts are often relatively cheap, but can be washed away by the weather over periods of time, so are considered more of a short term deterrent.
